"Coffee with the President"

PROF. SUVARNA S. KHADILKAR

AN INTERVIEW BY DR. DHAVAL BELVI (Youth Council Member)



At the outset, I thank you Madam for your time and willingness to do this interview.

As the president of the prestigious MOGS, the largest, by membership, OBGY society of the FOGSI family, what is the vision you have for MOGS, in your presidential tenure, and beyond?

My vision for MOGS is to continue its legacy of excellence in OBGY by fostering innovation, enhancing member engagement, and promoting research and education.

I have announced my theme for the year caring for women from Adolescence to Senescence.... Support, Strengthen and Sustain!!!!! I aim to support, strengthen, sustain the wellness and health of women at all ages and welfare of our membership of our society as well as the organisation. I aim to make our organization robust, financially stable, and independent. I have undertaken several new ventures like training programmes for young members, activities on say no to violence against women.

I have initiated a tie up with AMC to protect our members from violence against them at their clinics and hospitals. I have undertaken several academic activities like webinars, train the trainers programs and outreach programs with help from our academic partners. We will have 8 conferences during my tenure. In my Presidential webinar series, centered on this year's theme, I have invited esteemed national and international experts who are leaders in their respective fields. This has provided more opportunities for professional development and collaboration I wish to see that the MOGS stands as a strong ethically sound, financially independent charitable trust.

Having spent more than 3 decades in all capacities and roles, climbing the proverbial ladder, and now, as President, how have you seen MOGS evolving over the years from the days of landlines, physical ballots and letters, to email and WhatsApp?

MOGS has evolved tremendously from the days of landlines and physical ballots to the digital age of SMS, e-voting, emails and WhatsApp. Since the last four years we are conducting e-Voting successfully. During my tenure, I have implemented a Go Green initiative. This transformation has enhanced communication efficiency. Our audience reach is very wide and far and making our operations more economical. The society has grown in membership and influence, adapting to the changing needs of our members and the medical community. I have







always been a proponent of digital evolution in every society I have worked for. In 2011, I revamped the website of the AMWI Mumbai branch, initiated group messaging to connect with all members, and for the first time, began calling for all meetings electronically and sending proceedings digitally, thereby saving the environment. As President of IMS national, I, for the first time ever started the "E-certification course" on Menopause management where in the participant would get the "E certificate" also digitally.



What is your earliest memory of MOGS?

As third-year MBBS students back in 1981, we were posted at Cama Hospital. We would observe our teachers and senior residents, impeccably dressed for the event, rushing off to the MOGS conference held at prestigious South Bombay hotels like the Tai and Oberoi, just 10 minutes away from Cama hospital. At that time, I was guite intrigued and wondered how they managed all this in addition to their heavy emergency duties and long OT lists. Later, as a resident doctor in the same hospital, my teachers encouraged me to present papers in MOGS conferences. Little did I know that one day I would become the president of this prestigious organization.

That is great! The incredible journey from Cama Resident to MOGS President is truly inspiring!!! You've worked with so many stalwarts along your journey, what has been their contribution in your growth?

I must say, I am who I am today because of my mentors and teachers. Prof. C. N. Purandare, my mentor, shaped my career and introduced me to MOGS, FOGSI, JOGI, and now FIGO. Prof. Kamal Deshmukh, the head of the department, was a motherly figure -always supportive and encouraging me to achieve more. Dr. Jasmine Lopez, my postgraduate teacher, guided me through my thesis, boosted my confidence, and taught me how to be a good teacher. Prof. Usha Saraiya introduced me to AMWI, and my first house post was under her, where I learned my basics while working in her unit. Dr. Indu Vijaykar, Dr. Vimal Parikh, Dr. Asha Singhal, Dr. Seeta Tilwani, Dr. Sadhana Desai, Dr. Shivkar and Dr. Palep have all influenced my career as a clinician.

I started my term as an MC member with Dr. Duru Shah, and it was a great experience. My menopause committee received the Best Committee award for three consecutive years! Thereafter, I learnt many new things from all my predecessors in MOGS. Each President has a unique skill set and style of working, and I thoroughly enjoyed observing them. They taught me, as a President, what one should do and what one should not.

You have been a post graduate teacher for decades at for decades at JJ, CAMA and Bombay Hospital. What, in your opinion, can MOGS do, liasioning with teaching hospitals, to train the resident doctors?

I have seen both sides very closely over the last 38 years! We have a wealth of expertise in MOGS, as well as in medical colleges and universities. However, there are certain skills that practitioners possess and others that teachers from universityaffiliated institutes have. In the interest of betterment and comprehensive development of our next generation, we should collaborate with each other to develop educational modules and offer students a complete package of training material. One such initiative I have already started on the MOGS platform. i.e. the training courses for young graduates to provide them with hands-on experience.

You have also been EIC of JOGI, and









now, DEPUTY EDITOR IN CHIEF OF THE INTERNATIONAL JOURNAL OF OBGY (IJGO) the official publication FIGO, probably one of the most reputed journals of OBGY.

What according to you is the importance of publishing the good work done, and what could be done to encourage more work being reported and published, especially since so much good clinical work happens in Mumbai?

I must say that writing is not everybody's cup of tea. You need to have interest, initiative and flare for writing articles! It is a paradox that busy clinicians may not find time to sit down and analyse the data and also to review the literature. Many clinicians may not be interested in presenting their work to the peers. As the editor in chief of JOGI, we have conducted several research methodology workshops across the country and, we did witness the improvement in the quality of the articles that we received. So writing good quality articles, will generate interest in readers to write. Publishing your work has several advantages, it gives you a recognition that you are an authority in the field, and it also helps with promotions in the jobs and you are known worldwide as an expert in the same field.



Where do you wish to see MOGS 10 years down the line?

I definitely wish to see MOGS as the strongest body both financially as well as academically. I also want to see MOGS Leadering the national as well as international gynaecological societies. However, the solid foundation that has been laid by our predecessors will sustain itself, only if the future presidents take deep interest and work hard towards fulfilling vision and mission of MOGS. It certainly has the potential to be the world leader.

You are also Chairperson of the Menopause committee of FIGO.

It has been a subject close to your heart. What do you think needs to be done to improve the quality of life in menopausal age women, and what is your plan of action for the same?

My plan includes launching awareness campaigns, training healthcare providers on menopause management and advocating for policies that support women's health at menopause. Currently India does not have any policy covering midlife women, like wise many countries do not have such policies, our committee will work on the advocacy and also publications on MHT. Improving the quality of life for menopausal women requires a multi-faceted approach, including education, access to healthcare, and support systems. I hope we can lead this campaign smoothly and fulfil the aims & the objectives of our committee.

In addition, I have been assigned the task of being Scientific Advisor to FIGO World Congress 2025, to be held at Cape Town, South Africa. I understand that it is a significant responsibility and, in that conference, we will get to showcase our committee work. We will advise to have focussed deliberations on menopause for staying updated with the latest research, collaborating with international experts.

Last year you won the MOGS personality of the year award!! tell us Something about your hobbies and interests, beyond OBGY?

Dancing, singing, playing harmonium are my favourite hobbies and I love writing poems, sketching. I always played









badminton and represented college at intercollegiate levels tournaments. But my best time is with my family particularly with my grandson Agastya.



How and when did you decide to take up medicine and what were the reasons you chose OBGY?

My mother always wanted me to take up medicine, and she also wanted me to work for poor and needy women. So, I decided to take up medicine as she had instilled in me the passion for helping others. By God's grace I got a PG seat in OBGYN and post MD, I chose to be a full-time teacher in public hospital as it allowed me to pursue my passion of teaching and serving poor and needy women. I knew that this branch has a significant impact on women's health and well-being, from childbirth to menopause.

Your husband is an accomplished neurophysician, your son and daughter are pursuing their own careers and you are also a grandmother. What role have they played in your journey to President?

My family has been my pillar of support. No Country For Women: An Insight From A Female Medico

n a country like India, it takes a special kind of super power to be born as a woman and Herculean efforts combined with a great deal of luck to continue surviving as a woman. Instances of violence against women is nothing new in our country. Similarly, instances of the general public beating up medical professionals is something that the country has gotten used to. The entire nation has been shaken with the news of the suspected gangrape and violent murder of a second year female resident doctor at RG Kar Medical College and Hospital in Kolkata on 9th August, 2024. A lot of times, when we come across news of crimes against women, a lot of questions come in people's minds: what was she wearing? Why was she out late at night? Who was she hanging out with? Befuddling all these questions, here was a lady doctor who was raped and murdered while on duty within her hospital premises. Back in 2019, an intern doctor developed pneumocephalus after being beaten up by patient attendants. Since then, the medical community has been demanding a Central Protection act (CPA) in place at hospitals to punish perpetrators involved in crimes against healthcare professionals. 5 years have passed but there has been no change in the plight of medicos in this country.

However, one would be mistaken if they consider this to be an issue that only concerns the medical fraternity. In 2012, the whole world was shaken by the cruelty involved in the rape and consequent death of Nirbhaya in Delhi. It has been 12 years and India's daughters are still being gang-raped and murdered while on duty, while in uniform. During my undergrad and postgrad studies, my parents used to feel relieved once I informed them that I have reached my hospital. Personally, I have always had a sense of invincibility while inside the hospital campus: none of the deviants of the outside world can touch me within these boundaries. Our workplace is like our sanctum. And the sanctity of our workplace has been destroyed. A hospital is a place of healing and hope. The place that used to feel like a warm hug has now become a nightmare. Even as I write this, I am coming across news of drunk patients and attendants physically assaulting female residents at Sion Hospital, angry patient attendants threatening to pull an RG Kar on another female doctor in Delhi, inebriated patient banging the head of his female attending doctor in Andhra...the list is endless. We have collectively failed as a society when repetitive crimes like these happen and our elected administrators do nothing about them except verbal assurances of safety. For a nation that contributes less than 2% of its GDP to the health sector, it is unsurprising that there is no proper call room for onduty doctors, there is no hygienic washroom for doctors, there is not even a safety latch on the doors of the doctor's resting rooms and just about anybody can go in at will! Society is quick to nitpick the doctor's supposed negligence if a doctor loses a patient. However, the same society is silent when a doctor has lost her life and the administration is busy covering up the crime scene and aiding misappropriation of evidence.

The ghastly nature of the crime is worrisome. What happens to be more worrisome is the collective effort of an entire governance to protect the perpetrators, to tamper the evidence and to delay justice. Doctors across India withdrew their services from non-emergency sectors









with one basic demand: safety at the workplace. Their protest was supported by every layer of society: from the poor patient who comes to a government OPD to the highly educated celebrity delivering a talk on national television. In Mumbai, Azad Maidan has seen participation from all strata of society with aged and respected medical faculties joining the protest in the scorching sun. Following solid reassurances of a Central Protection Act (CPA), central forces have been deployed at RG Kar Medical College and Hospital, the investigation has been taken up by the CBI and doctors have withdrawn their strike because at the end of the day, we have a moral responsibility to serve the sick. However, it has been almost a month and Abhaya is still awaiting justice. Doctors across Bengal are still on strike, the administration is doing all that it can to curb any voice of dissent but the dissidence grows among the masses. The country and the state that worships Maa Durga every year has one unified voice reverberating throughout the motherland: "Justice For Abhaya". If we cannot respect our mothers and sisters in the flesh, what right do we have to worship lifeless idols of goddesses?

Even as we all feel this angst about this incident, we also realize that there will always be female doctors running across dark corridors at midnight trying to reach the blood bank for blood, there will always be policewomen patrolling dark alleys at night on their patrol bikes, there will always be corporate women troubleshooting international software bugs at odd hours of the night, there will always be women working in the dead of night at airport counters. It is the government's moral responsibility to provide safety which is a basic human right. This is one time too many and we are not backing down until we create a better nation for women.

To all Indian women, who are born with a spirit of steel!







Intriguing OBGYN Trivia:Pioneers, Discoveries and Fascinating Facts

1) What were "lying-in" hospitals, and when did they originate?

Answer: Hospitals providing specialized care for childbirth, originating in the 18th century.

Lying - in hospitals were established to provide care for women during childbirth, particularly for the poor. The first such institution was established in London in 1749.

Many early lying-in hospitals required women to follow strict rules, including staying in bed for several days after delivery, this was later found to increase the risk of developing venous thrombosis.

These traces of history can still be found in the city, with these hospitals bearing the name 'Lying-in Hospital

- 1) The Parsi Lying-in Hospital (PLIH), also known as Tehmulji's Lying-in Hospital at Fort, was one of the first maternity hospitals of Bombay district established in 1887. It was founded by legendary physician and obstetrician Tehmulji Bhicaji Nariman (3 September 1848–1 August 1940). Hospital is not functional.
- 2) Ruxmani Lying-In Hospital, Malabar Hill
- 3) Dr. Gupte Lying-In & Surgical Hospital, Khar.

2) What is the origin of the term "Caesarean"?

Answer: It is believed to be derived from Julius Caesar, though this is not proven.

The term "Caesarean" is thought to be related to the birth of Julius Caesar, but historical evidence does not support this. It is more likely derived from the Latin word "caedere," meaning "to cut."

In ancient times, cesarean sections were often performed only when the mother had died or was near death, as survival was rare.

3) Who first used chloroform as an anesthetic during childbirth, and when?

Answer: Sir James Young Simpson in 1847.

Simpson pioneered the use of chloroform to relieve labor pain, becoming a controversial figure in his time. Queen Victoria later popularized its use by requesting chloroform for the birth of Prince Leopold in 1853.

Interesting Fact: Simpson tested chloroform on himself and his friends, becoming unconscious in the process before realizing its potential.

4) Which physician significantly reduced maternal deaths by introducing handwashing in obstetrics?

Answer: Ignaz Semmelweis.

In 1847, Semmelweis noticed that puerperal fever (childbed fever) mortality rates were lower in midwife-supervised clinics than in physician-supervised clinics. He mandated handwashing with a chlorinated lime solution, drastically reducing deaths.

Interesting Fact: Despite his success, Semmelweis faced fierce opposition from his peers and died in obscurity, with his theories only widely accepted after his death.

5) Who started the first birth control clinic in India, and when?

Answer: Dr. Raghunath Dhondo Karve started the first birth control clinic in India in 1921

Dr. Raghunath Dhondo Karve, a professor of mathematics and an advocate of birth control, opened India's first family planning and birth control clinic in Bombay (now Mumbai) in 1921. His efforts were groundbreaking in the context of the time, as birth control was a taboo subject in India. Karve was inspired by his father, Maharshi Dhondo Keshav Karve, a well-known social reformer.

Despite facing strong opposition from both conservative sections of society and the government, Karve persisted in his mission to promote birth control as a means to control population growth and improve women's reproductive health.

Dr. Karve not only opened a clinic but also launched a monthly magazine, Samaj Swasthya (Public Health), to spread awareness about reproductive health and family planning. He was way ahead of his time, and his work eventually influenced later efforts in India's family planning movement, although he did not receive much recognition during his lifetime.

Later Dr. Avabai Wadia opened birth control clinic in Mumbai in 1933. This was a significant milestone in India's family planning movement. Wadia went on to found the Family Planning Association of India (FPAI) in 1949, which became a key institution in promoting birth control and reproductive health services across the country.

6) When were birth control pills first approved by the FDA?

Answer: In 1960.

The first oral contraceptive, Enovid, was approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) in 1960. This marked a significant moment in reproductive health, giving women unprecedented control over family planning.

Interesting Fact: The pill's development was largely funded by private individuals like Katharine McCormick, a women's rights activist

7) What family is credited with inventing the obstetrical forceps, and when?

Answer: The Chamberlen family in the 16th century.

The Chamberlens kept their invention a closely guarded secret for generations, only revealing the forceps design after the death of the last male heir.

Interesting Fact: The Chamberlens carried their forceps to each delivery in a box to avoid suspicion, ensuring no one knew what tools they used.

- 8) Which institution in India was the first to offer formal medical education to women?

Answer: The Lady Hardinge Medical College in Delhi

Founded in 1916, Lady Hardinge Medical College was the first medical college for women in India. It was established to provide education and training in western medicine exclusively for women, helping address the acute shortage of female medical practitioners during the British colonial period.

Interesting Fact: The college was named after Lady Hardinge, the wife of the then Viceroy of India, who played a significant role in advocating for women's medical education in India.

9) Who was the first female obstetrician and gynecologist in India?

Answer: Dr. Kadambini Ganguly.

Dr. Kadambini Ganguly, one of the first two women to graduate with a degree in medicine in India in 1886, was the first Indian female doctor to practice western medicine. She played a significant role in advancing medical care for women in India and is









celebrated for breaking barriers in the medical profession.

Interesting Fact: Apart from her medical practice, she was an active participant in the Indian independence movement and an advocate for women's rights.

10) Who was the world's first "test-tube baby," and when was she born?

Answer: Louise Brown in 1978.

Louise Brown was born as a result of the first successful in vitro fertilization (IVF), an event that revolutionized fertility treatments. Interesting Fact: Louise Brown's birth was widely publicized, sparking ethical debates

about "playing God" and the future of reproductive medicine.

11) When was the first successful hysterectomy performed, and by whom?

Answer: In 1843 by Charles Clay.

Charles Clay, an English surgeon, performed the first successful hysterectomy for uterine fibroids. At the time, surgery was a high-risk endeavor due to the lack of anesthetics and antiseptics.

Interesting Fact: Clay's procedure took over 120 minutes, and the patient survived, marking a turning point in gynecological surgery.

- 12) When & where was the first successful uterine transplant that resulted in a live birth? And Which Surgeon made this possible later in India?

Answer: In 2014, in Sweden.

The first successful uterine transplant resulting in a live birth occurred at the University of Gothenburg in Sweden. The patient had been born without a uterus and received a transplant from a living donor.

The first successful uterine transplant in India that resulted in a live birth was performed in Pune, Maharashtra, in 2018. The surgery was led by Dr. Shailesh Puntambekar and his team at the Galaxy Care Hospital. The patient, who had been born

without a uterus, received a transplant from her mother. This was a groundbreaking achievement in Indian medical history and highlighted the country's advancements in reproductive medicine and gynaecological endoscopy.


